Ecolinc wins 2009 National Savewater Award and 2009 AILA Award for Design in Landscape Architecture

Ecolinc has been awarded the 2009 National Savewater Award for Educational Institutions. The award recognizes 'outstanding innovation and achievement in water management and conservation'.

Ecolinc leads by example when it comes to saving water, with ecological sustainable design principles used during the design and construction of the centre, now incorporated in curriculum programs. The site includes two 22,500 litre tanks for flushing indoor toilets and watering within the horticultural area, as well as two outdoor waterless composting toilets. The 654,000 litre habitat wetland recycles urban stormwater. The facility includes an online building maintenance system that monitors water and energy use. Ecolinc has contributed to countless litres of water being saved as a flow on effect of students using their Ecolinc experience to begin water saving initiatives within their own schools and homes.

Ecolinc has also been awarded a 2009 Australian Institute of Landscape Architects (AILA) Design in Landscape Architecture Award with a special commendation for Education Facilities. As an outdoor classroom, the landscape setting extends opportunities for innovative curriculum through active participation in ecological and horticultural activities. 'To take a grassy paddock and convert it into a valued environmental centre is inspirational.

To reconnect it with its river setting through carefully considered stormwater management and indigenous habitat planting is environmentally responsible landscape architecture at its best.' (http:// www.aila.org.au/victoria/ awards2009/ecolink.htm)

Ecolinc launched 'Digging up the Diprotodon' for Children's Week. In addition to exploring the Geological Trail, students investigated the footprints of giant kangaroos, wombats and the Diprotodon, which have been preserved as casts from megafauna trackways discovered in western Victoria. The casts were constructed by Museum Victoria and are currently on loan to Ecolinc from the University of Ballarat.
